Day One—Sermon Application

The Pharisees—a conservative religious group—took pride in their prestigious role as the only ones doing God's will. They sought to obstruct Jesus in every step of His ministry—often challenging him and even conspiring to put him to death. Read John 6:35-47. What did Jesus teach in this passage that contradicted the Pharisees way of thinking? Do you recognize any tendencies or thought patterns that indicate you are becoming more like the Pharisees?

We need to ask:

- . What should we do to ensure we are following God's plans and not our own?
- What might need to change—our attitude, priorities, or pattern of behavior?
- What actions have you seen (or done) that have hindered the gospel from reaching the hearts of those who need to hear and receive it?

Day Three—Sermon Anticipation

Many modern churches admit that they have deliberately redesigned the worship service in order to make as few demands as possible on the person in the pew. Their reasoning is that they do not want the "unchurched" to feel intimidated.

Christianity is not a spectator sport. Practically the worst thing any churchgoer can do is be a hearer but not a doer (James 1:22-25). Christ himself pronounced doom on religious people who wanted to be mere bystanders (Matthew 7:26-27).

This is why Scripture portrays the church as a body—an organism with many parts, where each member has a unique role, and all contribute something important to the life of the body (1 Corinthians 12:14-26).

Spend some time today meditating on these passages. Ask the Lord a few questions:

Lord, am I a member of a local body? Lord, am I faithfully using my talent in this
body? Lord, what positive or negative things are happening at Temple because
of the way we are all functioning or not functioning together?
