AUDITORIUM REMODEL

I want to give you an update on the progress of the remodeling of our auditorium and commend all of the volunteers that have been working vigorously to get the work completed. The first week of work was a whirlwind—removal of the pews, deconstruction of the old stages (all of them), and construction of the new stage. The second week of work slowed considerably, but that wasn't a problem since we were so far ahead of schedule!

The Building Committee was asked to make a difficult decision about the flooring for the stage. The old pew backs are very hard and there was concern over whether this lumber could be used. It was decided to install engineered wood flooring for the stage and use the wood from the pews for other projects.

The Decorating Team chose a wood floor that coordinates with our carpet choices. They are also choosing paint colors and painting should begin in the auditorium in the near future. Once all the painting is complete, the new carpet and stage flooring will be installed.

The projected timeline for this project is to have everything finished by Palm Sunday. We again want to thank everyone who is helping to make this happen!
