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Introduction: Family Devos Vol. 2

Welcome to Family Devos: Vol. 2! I hope that you found the first volume helped you fulfill God's call for you as a family. Remember, God LOVES families and has designed it to be the primary means of discipleship for children and teens from generation to generation. His instruction for Israel still reflects His heart for families today:

⁴ "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. ⁵ You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. ⁶ And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. ⁷ You shall



teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. ⁸ You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. ⁹ You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates." (Deuteronomy 6:4-9, emphasis added)

As we begin the next round of Family Devos, you may get a sense of déjà vu but also notice a few changes. First, you'll notice that we're covering the same topics—salvation, prayer, Bible study, community, worship, service, and solitude—as the previous Family Devo book but from a different perspective. Whereas the first devo book Defined these, this devo book

will look at how Jesus Demonstrated or taught about them. Second, you'll notice that these same practices are covered in a different order than before. This was done in an effort to match them with a spiritual discipline that is closely tied to them that will covered on Sunday mornings as we continue through our current sermon series.

As with our previous book, each family devo features an opening question or activity, memory verse, Bible passage to read together and discussion questions to be used at your discretion based on the age of your children. The content can be spread throughout the week or completed in one sitting depending on your family schedule. For more information on how to use this devo, check out the instructions on page 7.

As you use this Family Devo, remember to keep these practical instructions from our previous devo book in your mind:



1. God has called you.

When God gave you your first child, He called you—especially fathers —to lead your children spiritually. When God calls you, He provides the means to fulfill this call. Rely on Him.

2. Be intentional with your time.

Joshua told the people of Israel to "...choose *this* day whom you will serve..." You'll never just get around to it. Pick a time, pick a place and stick to it as best you can. You might even tie family devo time to an already established routine to create the habit. Whether mornings or evenings, the important thing is to be consistent and keep at it.

3. Quality over quantity.


Kids can only pay attention so long. Start small and add time as you continue meeting together. Even 5 minutes together in the Word can reap eternal dividends.

4. Give yourself grace.

If Family Devos aren't going the way you envisioned they would or should, don't be discouraged. Remember, God is for you and wants you to succeed in this endeavor; you may just need to change things up a bit. He supplies the grace needed to do this well and the grace needed when it doesn't go the way you want.

My prayer continues to be that these devos equip you to be able to disciple your children in the grace and knowledge of Jesus Christ. Let us continue to remember to, "Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise, *making the best use of the time*, because the days are evil." (Ephesians 5:15-16) and daily point our kids to Christ.

Essential Elements Demonstrated: Worship

Week Eight

Getting Started:

Option #1: In today's story, people waved palm branches and laid them on the ground

for Jesus. Create a palm branch out of paper and write out ways you can

worship Jesus on it.

Option #2: Work together to create a cheer for Jesus.

Memory Verse

"I will bless the Lord at all times; his praise will always be on my lips." [Psalm 34:1]

Introduction:

Worship is the way we say "Thank you" to God by offering our best gift to Him. Whether it's a song or time or money, we can worship God with our life through everything we do. Today we'll see a time in Jesus' life when He was worshipped by a crowd while entering a place called Jerusalem. Let's see why they worshipped Jesus and why we should too.

Read: Matthew 21:1-11

Talk about it:

The story we just read said that as Jesus entered Jerusalem, people were spreading leaves on the ground and laying their clothes on the road to honor and worship Jesus. Why do you think they wanted to do this for Jesus?



The crowd worshiped Jesus because of who He is.

- 1. What did the crowd shout when they saw Jesus?
- 2. What do you think "Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord" means?
- 3. In light of this, what makes Jesus worthy of your worship?



Why is it important to recognize who God is when we worship Him?

Jesus came into Jerusalem in a very special way. The crowd saw what Jesus was doing and they got excited. What is something that Jesus has done that makes you excited?

The crowd worshiped Jesus because of what He did.

- 1. What was Jesus riding when He entered Jerusalem?
- 2. According to verses 4-5, why was this important?
- 3. What is something that Jesus has done for you that makes you want to worship Him?



Digging Deeper:

Why is it important that Jesus fulfilled prophecy?

How can remembering that Jesus keeps His promises change the way you worship Him?

When the crowd saw Jesus and what He was doing they started cheering for Jesus. They shouted, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!" What do you think, "Hosanna" means?

The crowd worshiped Jesus by praising Him.

- 1. What does it mean to praise someone?
- 2. What are some of the ways you praise Jesus?
- 3. According to what we learned in this devo, why should you worship and praise Jesus?



Digging Deeper:

What often keeps you from praising Jesus?

Why do you think that is?


What should you do when you don't feel like praising Jesus?

Pray About It:

Think about ways you can daily remind yourself of who Jesus is and what He has done for you. Maybe you could write out some Bible verses on post it notes to put on a mirror or in a school binder or make a playlist with praise songs to listen to throughout the week. Whatever you choose, take some time this week to praise and thank God for what He's done in your life.

At the end of each Family Devo, spend time taking requests, giving thanks, and askir God's help to live out what you just discussed.				

Essential Elements Demonstrated: Bible Study



Week Nine

Getting Started:

Option #1: Name some signs you see when you're riding in the car. What are these road

signs for?

Option #2: BIBLE DRILL! Pick a verse or book of the Bible for your kids to find. Have a

competition to see who can find it first. Play as many rounds as you would like

but end with the passage for the devo.

Memory Verse

"This book of instruction must not depart from your mouth; you are to meditate on it day and night so that you may carefully observe everything written in it. For then you will prosper and succeed in whatever you do ." (Joshua 1:8)

Introduction:

The Bible is the inspired Word of God that teaches us about salvation through faith in Jesus and prepares us for every good work. It shows us the way we should go and will help us do what is right if we do what it says. Let's look at how Jesus used the Bible to do what was right when He faced temptation.

Read: Matthew 4:1-11

Talk about it:

In this story, Jesus was in the wilderness being tempted by the devil. This means that the devil was trying to get Jesus to sin by disobeying God's Word. Jesus knew this and quoted the Bible to help Him do the right thing. Why was Jesus able to quote the Bible?



Jesus knew what the Bible said.

- 1. How do you get to know what the Bible says?
- 2. Psalm 119:11 says, "I have hidden your word in my heart that I might not sin against you." (NLT) What do you think it means to hide God's Word in your heart?



Digging Deeper:

Look at the answer Jesus gave to the devil in Matthew 4:4.

How does man,
"not live on bread alone
but on every word
that comes from the
mouth of God"?

3. Can you quote some Bible verses that you have "hidden in your heart"?

It's important to know the Bible and hide it in our hearts by memorizing it, but it's also important to do what the Bible says. Let's look at Jesus' example again. In the story we read, did Jesus do what the devil tempted Him to do or what the Bible said?

Jesus obeyed what the Bible said.

- 1. Why do you think Jesus obeyed the Bible? (Read John 14:31)
- 2. Read Psalm 119:9-11, John 6:68; 14:15. What do these verses say about why you should obey the Bible?
- 3. What happens if you don't do what the Bible says? What should you do if (and when) that happens?



Digging Deeper:

Read James 1:22.

What does it mean to be "doers of the word"?

Can we pick which parts to do and not to do? Why or why not?

When you follow Jesus, you will be tempted to disobey God from time to time. God knows this and has given you the Bible to help fight temptation. How was Jesus able to do the right thing when He was tempted?

Jesus did what was right by trusting what the Bible said.

- 1. Read Psalm 119:11 again. What does this verse say the Bible will keep you from?
- 2. Read Ephesians 6:17; Hebrews 4:12. How do you think the Bible is like a sword that can help you fight temptation?
- 3. What verses do you know that can help you fight temptation?



Digging Deeper:

What would have happened if Jesus had given into temptation?

How would that have changed the story of the Bible?

Pray about it:

Are there things in your life that tempt you to disobey God? Look for Bible verses that can help you fight this temptation. Memorize these verses and repeat them to yourself the next time you face temptation

At the end of each Family Devo, spend time taking requests, giving thanks, and asking God's help to live out what you just discussed.					



Essential Elements Demonstrated: Service

Week Ten

Getting Started:

Option #1: What are some of the chores you do around the house? When is the last time you did your chores without being asked?

Option #2: Have everyone balance a book on their head. Try to walk around the house without the book falling off. If a book falls off someone's head, they have to freeze. They can only be unfrozen when someone with a book on their head touches their hand. See how many are left with the book on their head at the end of 2 minutes.

Memory Verse

"...whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first among you must be your slave; just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." [Matthew 20:26b-28]

Introduction:

Jesus said that He came, "...not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Matthew 20:28) When we follow Jesus we're called to be like Him and serve those around us. This means we help take care of others when they have a need without being asked. Let's take a look at how Jesus served others to see how we should serve one another.



Read: Matthew 14:13-14; Mark 6:34

Talk about it:

In the passage we just read, Jesus was trying to take a break with His disciples but some people heard where He was going and followed Him there. Jesus could have been annoyed and sent the people away but he didn't. What did Jesus feel when He saw the crowds?

Jesus served others with compassion.

1. What does it mean to be compassionate?



Digging Deeper:

How did Mark 6:34 describe the people?

What do you think that means?

If you were to view people in this way, would it cause you to be more compassionate with them?

- 2. Do you look at people like this?
- 3. Why do you think it is important to be compassionate when serving all people?

Now let's look at a time in Jesus' life when He served in a way no one else wanted to serve. Read John 13:3-5. What did Jesus do for His disciples?

Jesus served others with humility.

- 1. What do you think humility is? How did Jesus show humility by washing the disciples' feet?
- 2. Why is it important to be humble when serving one another?
- 3. How can you stay humble when serving others?



Digging Deeper:

"Humility is not thinking less of yourself, but thinking of yourself less."

What do you think this quote means?

Why is it important to make this distinction?

After Jesus washed the disciples' feet, He said, "For I have given you an example, that you also should do just as I have done for you." (John 13:15) Jesus also said that when you follow His example and serve others you're actually serving someone else, too. Read Matthew 25:35-40. Who does Jesus say you serve when you serve others?

We serve Jesus by serving others.

- 1. Who do you think are the least Jesus mentions in verse 40?
- 2. When and how should we serve them?
- 3. How should this verse change the way that you think about serving?



Digging Deeper:

Read Colossians 3:23-24.

Have you ever thought of your daily actions as acts of service to Jesus?

How would thinking in this way change the way you act at school or at home?

Pray about it:

Ask God to show you who you need to serve this week. It can be a family member, a friend, or someone else at work or school that you don't talk with often. Once you have someone in mind, think about ways you can serve them this week.

At the end of each Family Devo, spend time taking requests, giving thanks, and asking
God's help to live out what you just discussed.

Essential Elements Demonstrated: Prayer



Week Eleven

Getting Started:

Option #1: Build a tower with Legos, blocks, or whatever you can find. While building,

have someone read Psalm 61:1-4 and talk about how God is our strong

tower and a place we can run to in times of trouble.

Option #2: Think about your day. When did you pray?

What do you usually pray about the most?


Memory Verse

"God, hear my cry; pay attention to my prayer.

I call to you from the ends of the earth when my heart is without strength. Lead me to a rock that is high above me, for you have been a refuge for me, a strong tower in the face of the enemy." (Psalm 61:1-3)

Introduction:

BIBLE



Read: Mark 14:32-37

Talk about it:

Jesus was facing the hardest time in His life and knew that He needed to pray. Where did Jesus go to pray? What did He do when He made it to the Garden?

Jesus went to be alone to pray.

- 1. Why do you think Jesus wanted to be alone to pray?
- 2. Is it easier to pray when it's loud or when it's quiet?
- 3. What can you do to help keep your focus on God when you pray?

We should be respectful when we pray to God but He doesn't want us to hide our feelings. God likes it when we are open and honest with Him when we pray. What was Jesus praying about in the Garden?



Digging Deeper:

Read Matthew 6:5-6.

Where did Jesus say we should go when we pray?

Why did He say this?

Does this mean we shouldn't pray in front of others?

Jesus was honest when He prayed and didn't hide anything from God the Father.



Digging Deeper:

Read Matthew 6:7-8.

Jesus said that
the Father knows
what we need before
we pray to Him.

If this is true, why do you think God wants us to pray?

- 1. What did Jesus ask for when He prayed?
- 2. Why was Jesus making this request? How did these verses say Jesus felt?
- 3. What is the first thing that you do when you're overwhelmed? Do you pray for help? Why or why not?

God can do anything but sometimes He doesn't answer our prayers in the way that we want because He knows what is best for us. How do you feel when you don't get what you want?

Jesus trusted God the Father with the answer to His prayer.

- What did Jesus say that showed He trusted God? 1.
- 2. What do you think "not what I will, but what you will" means?
- 3. Why is it important for us to remember and trust that God knows what is best for us?



Digging Deeper:

Has there ever been a time in your life when you asked God for something but He didn't answer in the way you thought He should?

What did you do?

What do you think He wanted teach you through this?

Pray about it:

Hebrews 4:16 says, "Therefore, let us approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in time of need." This means when we need help, we can pray and ask for God's help! That's amazing! Is there anything that you need God's help with? Why not ask for His help today?

Essential Elements Demonstrated: Solitude

Week Twelve

Getting Started:

Option #1: Play a few rounds of Simon says.

Option #2: Play the quiet game. See if your family can stay quiet for at least 3 minutes.

Memory Verse

"Rest in God alone, my soul, for my hope comes from him. He alone is my rock and my salvation, my stronghold; I will not be shaken." (Psalm 62:5-6)

Introduction:

It's important for Jesus' followers to take time each day to put away distractions and quietly meet with Jesus. Jesus wants us to draw close to Him and hear what He has to say but we must be willing to be still and listen. This week, let's look at a story of two sisters who had an opportunity to listen and learn from Jesus and see what they did.

Read: Luke 10:38-41

Talk about it:

In the story we read, a woman named Martha invited Jesus to come and stay with her family while He was traveling. How exciting! Jesus had come to visit! This was the perfect time to visit with Jesus and hear His teaching but the Bible said that Martha was doing something else. What did Martha do instead of listening to Jesus?



Martha was distracted—she was too busy.

- 1. How did Martha feel trying to do her "many tasks" by herself?
- 2. How do you feel when you try to do too many things at once?
- 3. How can busyness affect your relationship with Jesus?

Martha let all she had to do keep her from taking time to meet with Jesus and she became overwhelmed. We can feel the same way when life gets too busy. To avoid this, we should learn to be like Mary. What did Mary do when Jesus came to visit?



Digging Deeper:

When our lives begin to get busy, we're tempted to neglect our spiritual lives because we have other things that "need to get done."

Why do you think that is?

How can you learn to balance the things that need to get done and your need to meet with Jesus and trust God to work everything out?

Mary stopped to listen to Jesus.

1. What do you think Mary had to do to stop and listen to Jesus?



Digging Deeper:

Is there anything in your life that is more difficult for you to put down in order to spend time alone with Jesus?

If so, ask God to help you reorient your priorities to make Him first in your life.

- 2. What do you have to do in order to stop and listen to Jesus?
- 3. Why do you think it is so hard to be still and listen?

Martha started to be annoyed that Mary wasn't helping her. She asked Jesus to tell her sister to help her but Jesus told her only one thing was important in that moment. What was that one thing?

Spending time alone with Jesus is the most important thing we can do.

- 1. What did Jesus say about Mary's choice?
- 2. Why is it important to stop and listen to Jesus from time to time?
- 3. How often do you take time to be still and listen to Jesus?



Digging Deeper:

What did Martha accuse
Jesus of when she asked Him
to tell Mary to help her?

Was this true?

How can failing to spend time with Jesus affect the way you see Him or feel about Him?

Pray about it:

When we follow Jesus, it's easy to be distracted by all the things in our life and forget to slow down. Think about your daily routines. Is there a time when you pause to spending time with Jesus and listen to Him?

At the end of each Family Devo, spend time taking requests, giving thanks, and asking God's help to live out what you just discussed.					

Essential Elements Demonstrated: Community



Week Thirteen

Getting Started:

Option #1: Name someone that you admire and want to be like and talk about why you

want to be like this person.

Option #2: Think about some of your favorite teachers at school or at Temple. How do they show you that they love you?

Memory Verse

"I give you a new command: Love one another."

Just as I have loved you, you are also to love one another."

[John 13:34]

Introduction:

The first church in the book of Acts shows us what real community is like. They show us what being part of a church should be like and the kind of people we should want to be and hang out with. They all shared the same faith in Jesus Christ, cared for one another by selflessly sharing their lives, and all shared the same purpose by wanting to do whatever God called them to do. Before Jesus died on the cross, He gave His followers a command to help us enjoy

this kind of community. Let's take a look.

Read: John 13:34-35

Talk about it:

In the passage we just read, Jesus is speaking in the middle of a meal that he was having with His disciples. He knew that He would die on the cross the next day and so He had some important things that He wanted to say to them. What was the new commandment that Jesus gave to His disciples?

Jesus commands us to love one another.

- Why do you think Jesus wants His disciples to love one another?
- 2. Do we get to pick and choose who we love? Why or why not?
- 3. How do you show someone that you love them?

When Jesus commanded His disciples to love one another, He said they should love like someone they knew. Who did Jesus say the disciples should love like when they love one another?



Digging Deeper:

Jesus said that the way we interact with one another has an effect on our worship [Matthew 5:23-24].

Is there someone that has offended you that you need to forgive?

Is there someone that you have offended that you need to seek forgiveness from?

Jesus commands us to love like He has loved us.

- 1. How has Jesus shown His love for you? (Read Romans 5:8; 1 John 4:9)
 - 2. How would you describe Jesus' love for you?
 - 3. How can you show this same kind of love to those around you?



Is showing love to one another the same thing as agreeing with them?

Why or why not?

How do you make the distinction?

Jesus commands us to love one another as He has loved us. In fact, Jesus said that His followers should be known for the way they love one another. Is there something that people know you for? What is it?

Jesus' followers should be known by the way they love one another.

- 1. Can people tell that you are a follower of Jesus by the way you treat them?
- 2. How do you treat those around you—family, friends, strangers?
- 3. How can you treat those around you in a more loving way?



Digging Deeper:

Read 1 Corinthians 13:4-8a.

This is a description of the love Jesus' followers should have for one another.

If you put your name in place of the word 'love' would it be an accurate description of the way you treat those in the church and around you?

Pray about it:

Think about the different people you see every day. Is there someone that needs to know the kind of Christ-like love we talked about? Ask God to show you someone specific and think about how you will show them His love this week.

At the end of each Family Devo, spend time taking requests, giving thanks, and asking God's help to live out what you just discussed.

Salvation Demonstrated

Week Fourteen

Getting Started:

Option #1: Use what you can find around the house—LEGOs, blocks, toothpicks—to build a bridge. Talk about how Jesus bridges the gap that sin makes between mankind and God.

Option #2: Sing "Jesus Loves the Little Children" together.

Memory Verse

"For, 'everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.'" (Romans 10:13)

Introduction:

Jesus loves us and came to save us. He knows that everyone is a sinner and separated from Him and so He came to take the punishment for your sin by dying on the cross so that you could be saved by believing in Him and making Him the Lord or boss of your life. Everyone who believes in Him can be saved. Let's look at a time when Jesus showed His love to a group of children and see what this shows us about salvation.

Read: Luke 18:15-17

Talk about it:

In the story we just read, a group of people were trying to bring their children to see Jesus. The disciples tried to stop them because they thought the children would bother Jesus, but Jesus wasn't bothered by them. What did Jesus do for the children instead of sending them away?

Jesus invites you to come to Him through salvation.

- 1. Why do you think Jesus invited the children to come to Him? Why does He invite you?
- Digging Deeper:

If someone were to ask vou why they needed to be saved. what would you tell them?

- 2. Read Isaiah 59:2. What does this verse say separates you from God?
 - 3. Read Romans 5:8 & 1 Peter 3:18. What did these verses say Jesus did to save you? (Consider walking your children through the Roman Road of Salvation: Romans 3:23, 3:10, 6:23, 5:8, 10:9-10, 13)

When Jesus invited the children to come to Him, He said, "...whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it." Jesus was saying that salvation is a gift that He gives to you. What should you do when you want something that someone else has?

Salvation is given to those who ask.

- How do you ask for salvation?
- 2. Why do you think we have to ask for salvation?
- 3. What does the Bible say happens when we ask for Jesus to save us? (Read Romans 10:13) Why is this important?

Jesus' disciples thought they were helping Jesus by keeping Him from being bothered, but Jesus stopped them from turning people away. Why do you think Jesus He did this? (Read 1 Timothy 2:4)



Digging Deeper:

What do you think Jesus means when He said that the kingdom of God must be received "like a little child"?

> Why is it good for us to do this?

How should you depend on God "like a little child"?

Jesus invites everyone to be saved.

- 1. Why was it wrong for the disciples to turn the people away from Jesus?
- 2. Read Matthew 28:19-20. What does this verse say Jesus wants His followers to do?
- 3. Who will you tell about Jesus to this week?



Digging Deeper:

Read 2 Corinthians 5:18-20.

How do these verses describe the role of a believer in sharing the Gospel?

What do you think the "ministry of reconciliation" is?

Pray about it:

Think about the people that you see at school or at work. Who do you know that needs to hear about what Jesus has done for them? Ask God give you an opportunity to speak to them and the holdness to do it.

At the end of each Family Devo, spend time taking requests, giving thanks, and ask God's help to live out what you just discussed.

My hope is that as our church walks through the Essential Elements of Life in Christ, these Family Devos will help you and your family grow in Christ TOGETHER.

Though our current sermon series covers 14 spiritual disciplines that assist in spiritual growth, our family devos will only focus on the first six. This booklet will Define these six disciplines for you and a second booklet will follow midway through our series that will look at how these disciplines are Demonstrated in the Scriptures.

Our prayer is that these devos will help you create a habit of worshiping together as a family and will help you "Direct your children onto the right path, and when they are older, they will not leave it." [Proverbs 22:6, NLT]
