This got me thinking about that word—remarkable. According to the Cambridge English Dictionary, the word "remarkable" means "unusual or special and therefore surprising and worth mentioning." This little gadget is true to its name—that's why I'm mentioning it to you.

If you were to research the reason why some churches grow and others do not, one of the things that you would discover is that growing churches grow because the people who attend those churches tell their friends about their church! Author Rich Birch writes, "What's the difference

between the dying churches and prevailing churches? The latter is simply more remarkable. I mean that in a literal sense, as in thriving churches are literally worthy of the remarks of the people who attend them." Do We NEED Interruptions?

As many of you know, my wife and I recently emerged from quarantine due to COVID. I'm pretty sure we were stuck at home for 2 or 3 months but the calendar says it was only ten days. By the end of this time, I was ready to get back to my routine and get out and about again. It's not that I don't enjoy time with my family. I just don't like interruptions. And this was definitely an unwelcomed and unexpected interruption.

Jesus was no stranger to interruptions. Once, when he was preaching, a group of friends cut a hole in the roof of the building he was in and lowered a paralytic man through it. Another time, Jesus was on his way to heal a man's daughter who was on her deathbed when someone touched Him and He stopped to ask about it because he perceived that power had gone out of Him. Jesus was interrupted often and you could imagine that it would have been frustrating.

Yet, have you ever noticed that it was in these moments—these interruptions—that Jesus chose to do the miraculous and grow people's faith?

When the paralytic was lowered through the roof, he literally walked away not only healed

but with his sins forgiven.
And the woman with the issue of blood who touched Jesus' garment was not only healed but her faith was commended



and is now recorded in the Bible. Jesus didn't get frustrated but instead recognized the opportunity the Father had placed before Him.

So next time you and I face interruptions, embrace it. With God's help, don't ask, "Why?" but, "What?" What does God want me to learn? What does He want me to do? Ask taking the truth of Romans 8:28 to heart: "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose." (NIV)


