I am turning 40 this year. It's kind of a cool age for me. For young people, I am old and over the hill. For more seasoned people, I am still just a young pup. I really do feel like I am in the middle of life.

With that revelation for me has come some evaluation of what I have done with this life. What's the good, what's the bad. And one of things I have found myself thinking about most is this: Was I a good friend? Did I improve the community that God put me?

I want to encourage you to read 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11, but focus specifically on verse 11. It says "Therefore encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing."

This section talks about the limited time we have left on this earth, and that the Day of the Lord is not that far off. We are not to be people full of wrath, but rather we are to be kind and encouraging to one another. None of us knows the amount of time we have left on this earth—nor do we know how much time the people around us have left.

Encourage one another, build each other up, and share the gospel. That is what being a good friend looks like.

I have always had a love of reading. As a child I read everything in our school library.

About once a month I would check out a dozen or so books from a traveling bookmobile. Favorites were Zane Grey Westerns!

I had probably not read more than a

chapter or two, here and there, in the Bible until I was in my 20's. For the past several decades I have read the Bible through each year. I begin my day with four chapters every morning. Later in the day, the Scripture is compared with other Scriptures and devotional

commentaries are also examined.

I have discovered that what is written in the Bible never grows old, that every reading brings fresh insight and exciting discoveries. Scripture became questions answered, problems solved, and messages delivered.

Currently our pastor is digging deep into the Book of Luke, seeking the theme and letting the words and actions of our Lord inform, challenge, inspire and encourage. I hope you are allowing the Word to transform as you give attention to it.

our trust in Him. And in our waiting and our longing, He does not leave us alone but comes alongside us to comfort our hearts and remind us of the Truth of His Word.
